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PETITION FOR WRIT
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Petitioner, who may or may not qualify for the ballot to run for Governor, would like his candidate statement to be included in the official Voter Information Guide for the June primary. However, he missed the submission deadline. He now seeks a court order requiring the Secretary of State to include his candidate statement in the voter guide. The petition is meritless and should be denied. Petitioner simply missed the deadline and has not alleged any violation of his statutory or constitutional rights.

BACKGROUND

The California Statewide Direct Primary Election will be held on June 5, 2018. Under the controlling statutes, the Secretary of State has authority to establish "timeframes and procedures" for the submission of candidate statements for inclusion in the Voter Information Guide. (Gov. Code, § 85601, subd. (a).) For the upcoming primary, the deadline to submit candidate statements set by the Secretary of State was February 14, 2018. (See Declaration of Paul Stein, Exhibit A, Secretary of State's "Key Dates and Deadlines," p. 1 ["Candidate Statement Period for State Voter Information Guide (U.S. Senate and Constitutional Offices)" — Jan 25-Feb 14"].)¹ This deadline is necessitated by requirements that: (1) the Voter Information Guide be put on public display for a period of "[n]ot less than 20 days" before it is sent to the State Printer (Elec. Code, § 9092); and (2) the Voter Information Guide be sent to the State Printer no later than March 12, 2018, so it can be mailed to voters in a timely fashion before the primary. (Secretary of State's "Key Dates and Deadlines," p. 2 ["Copy Provided to State Printer — Mar 12"].)

The public display period for the June primary commenced on February 20 and concludes on March 12. (Secretary of State's "Key Dates and Deadlines," p. 1 ["Public Inspection Period — Feb 20-Mar 12"].) The purpose of the public display period is to give members of the public a chance to seek, and a court to require, changes to the Voter Information Guide if any material is proved by "clear and convincing proof" to be "false, misleading, or inconsistent with the requirements of [the Elections Code or the Government Code]." (Elec. Code, § 9092.)

SUMMARY OF PETITION

Petitioner, who is an "intended candidate for Governor," alleges that he wishes to purchase space to place a candidate statement in the statewide Voter Information Guide. (Petition, pp. 1-2.) Petitioner admits that: (1) he has not yet qualified for the ballot, and the deadline for doing that is March 9, i.e., today, at 5 p.m.; (2) he has not yet submitted his candidate statement to the Secretary of State's office for inclusion in the Voter Information Guide; and (3) it is too late to submit a candidate statement because the deadline was February 14, 2018. (*Ibid.*) Petitioner nonetheless requests that the Court order the Secretary of State to include his candidate statement in the voter information guide in the event that petitioner "qualifies to be on the ballot." (*Id.*, p. 2.) Petitioner further requests that the Court "affirm that nothing in petitioner's statement [which is attached to the petition] is unacceptable." (*Ibid.*)²

ARGUMENT

A. The petition lacks merit and should be denied.

Petitioner cites no statutory or constitutional authority supporting the requested relief, and there is none. As Petitioner admits, the controlling statutes provide that his candidate statement was due "in accordance with timeframes and procedures set forth by the Secretary of State for the preparation of the state ballot pamphlets." (Gov. Code, § 85601, subd. (a); see Petition, p. 3.) Thus, Petitioner's contention that the Secretary of State "[did] not have the statutory authority" to set the deadline on February 14 is plainly incorrect. The Government Code expressly authorizes the Secretary of State to establish the relevant "timeframes," and Petitioner alleges no facts demonstrating a violation of any ministerial duty, or an abuse of discretion, by the Secretary.

Nor has Petitioner cited any case or other authority (and we are not aware of any) that even contemplates the relief requested by Petitioner. If the Court were to order the Secretary of State to include Petitioner's candidate statement in the Voter Information Guide at this late date, there would be no opportunity for public review (because the guide must be sent to the State Printer by

² In his candidate statement, Petitioner promises, among other things, to: "revolutionize credit with a platform where every Californian can create their own cryptocurrency"; bring about "incarceration rates below Canada's, instead of 6 times higher"; usher in a "ground-breaking digital direct democracy platform, with no binding power initially, that will eventually become the standard for political systems worldwide." (Petition, p. 5.)

March 12). This would effectively nullify the public inspection regime mandated by Elections Code section 9092. Moreover, contrary to Petitioner's suggestion, it is not the Court's role to "affirm that nothing in petitioner's statement is unacceptable" (Petition, p. 2), but rather to rule on challenges brought by members of the public, based on evidence submitted by the parties. (Elec. Code, § 9092.) There is no legal or evidentiary basis upon which this Court could decide whether Petitioner's statement is "unacceptable" or not. More fundamentally, because no member of the public has come forward to challenge Petitioner's candidate statement (due to the fact that he missed the deadline for submitting it), there is no justiciable controversy over his statement that this Court could resolve.³

Contrary to Petitioner's contentions, requiring submission of his candidate statement before the last day for submitting his declaration of candidacy does not violate his free speech rights. (Petition, p. 3.) The February 14 deadline is reasonable, non-discriminatory, and amply justified by the need to ensure adequate time for the public review period and the other election deadlines and milestones that follow it. (Burdick v. Takushi (1992) 504 U.S. 428, 434 [where a state election requirement imposes "reasonable, non-discriminatory restrictions . . . the State's important regulatory interests are generally sufficient to justify the restrictions]", internal quotations and citation omitted; Rawls v. Zamora (2003) 107 Cal.App.4th 1110, 1116 ["[c]ourts will uphold . . . restrictions that are generally applicable, even-handed, politically neutral, and which protect the reliability and integrity of the election process"], internal quotations and citations omitted.) Indeed, the alleged burden here is exceedingly slight, if one exists at all. (See Petition, p. 3 [arguing that the February 14 deadline "pressure[s] a potential candidate, still deciding whether to commit themselves to the ballot, to author content on the hypotheticals of how they would promote their candidacy if they were to run"].) Petitioner has yet to qualify for the ballot, but he had no trouble submitting his candidate statement to the Court for its review and

³ Petitioner acknowledges that one reason the Secretary of State requires the submission of candidate statements by February 14 is to allow sufficient time for public review and court challenges; "[p]resumably... the Secretary of State does not wish to arbitrate which content would not be allowed...." (Petition, p. 2.) By the same token, the Court's job is not to decide whether Petitioner's candidate statement is acceptable in the absence of a challenge by the public.

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⁴ Petitioner's related request for an order requiring the Secretary of State to include his photograph in the voter information guide (see Petition, p. 6) should be denied for all the reasons discussed above.

approval in connection with this petition; and he has not alleged any facts suggesting that he could not have submitted exactly the same statement to the Secretary of State by February 14.

Finally, it would not be misleading to anyone, let alone "afflict[] a falsehood against Petitioner," if Petitioner's candidate statement were not included in the Voter Information Guide. (See Petition, p. 3.) A candidate who accepts the voluntary expenditure limits has the option of submitting a statement for the voter guide, but is not required to do so. (See Gov. Code, § 85601, subd. (a).) Therefore, there would be no basis for anyone to assume that Petitioner "did not accept the limit," or had "no statement he wished to make." (Petition, p. 3.)⁴

B. An immediate ruling is essential to preserve the election schedule.

In order to preserve the state's election schedule, the Court's ruling on this petition must issue no later than 5:00 p.m. on March 12, 2018. Elections Code section 9092 provides in part that a peremptory writ of mandate requiring state voter information guide revisions shall issue only if "issuance of the writ will not substantially interfere with the printing and distribution of the state voter information guide as required by law." (Emphasis added; see also Gov. Code. § 88006 [same].) Elections Code section 9094 requires that the bulk of the mailing of voter information guides to approximately 11 million households be completed no later than 21 days before the election, which is May 15, 2018. (See Declaration of David Gerald Hill, California State Printer [attached hereto as Exhibit 1], ¶ 3; Declaration of Jana M. Lean, Chief of Elections Division, California Secretary of State [attached hereto as Exhibit 2], ¶ 3.) In light of the necessary preparation work, and even with state printing presses operating on a 24-hour-a-day basis, all textual changes must be finalized by 5:00 p.m. on March 12, 2018, if the State is to meet the specified mailing and distribution deadlines. (See Hill Decl., ¶¶ 4-6; Lean Decl., ¶ 5.) Any changes made in the text after that time will affect the printing process and cause a delay in the delivery of the voter information guides to the voters and county elections officials. (See Hill Decl., ¶ 7; Lean Decl., ¶ 5.)

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DECLARATION OF JANA M. LEAN

I, Jana M. Lean, declare as follows:

- 1. I am the Chief of the Elections Division, employed in the Office of the California Secretary of State. There served in that capacity at all times pertinent to this action.
- 2. The Secretary of State is empowered by statute to perform numerous duties regarding California ballot measures. These include the placing of qualified initiatives and other ballot measures on the statewide ballot, the solicitation of arguments in favor of and against proposed ballot measures, the preparation and distribution of state voter information guide, and the overall supervision of the State's election process.
- 3. To date, the Legislature has placed five ballot measures on the ballot for the Statewide Direct Primary Election on June 5, 2018. By statute, the state voter information guide must be mailed to approximately 11 million households in ten different languages under strict statutory deadlines.
- 4. The entire process by which ballot measures are qualified for and placed on the ballot is subject to stringent time constraints imposed by law. On February 20, 2018, as required by law, the Secretary of State placed the state voter information guide on public display for a 20-day period ending on March 12, 2018.
- 5. I am informed and believe that, due to strict printing and logistical constraints, the State Printer must receive the final version of the state voter information guide by 5:00 p.m. on March 12, 2018, in order to ensure that the approximately 13 million required copies of the guide will be printed, bound, and distributed within the legally prescribed deadline. Printing of the guides in ten languages (English plus nine other languages) takes approximately four to six weeks. Under applicable law, guides must begin to be mailed to registered voters by April 26, 2018, and the mailing must be completed by May 15, 2018.

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6. I have personal knowledge of these facts and would competently testify to them if called as a witness to these proceedings.

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DECLARATION OF DAVID GERALD HILL

I, David Gerald Hill, declare as follows:

- 1. I am the State Printer of the State of California, appointed pursuant to Government Code section 14872. I have served in that capacity at all times pertinent to this action.
- 2. As the State Printer, I am responsible for printing and assisting in coordinated distribution of approximately 13 million state voter information guides for use prior to the statewide Primary Election on June 5, 2018.
- 3. By statute, these state voter information guides must be mailed to the bulk of the voters no later than 21 days before the election. To accomplish this, the printing and mailing of the guides must be completed by May 15, 2018, which is 21 days before the June 5, 2018 election. The small number of guides mailed after this date, for late registrants, does not alter the printing schedule.
- 4. To ensure that the state voter information guide is printed and mailed by the statutory deadline of May 15, 2018, the final text must be delivered to the Office of State Publishing no later than 5:00 p.m. on March 12, 2018.
- 5. The Office of State Publishing will require 55 working days to complete the printing of the current state voter information guide and mailing by both the Office of State Publishing and a private vendor under contract with the Secretary of State. This 55-day schedule assumes operation of the printing plant 24 hours per day, 6 days per week between March 12 and May 15, 2018, reserving the seventh day each week to address mechanical problems as necessary and to make up for any time lost in the printing processes as a result of such problems.
- 6. The 55-day schedule also assumes that the state voter information guides will be mailed by both the Office of State Publishing and a private vendor(s), at state expense, in order to meet the May 15, 2018 deadline.
- 7. Any changes in the text of the state voter information guide made after 5:00 p.m. on March 12, 2018, will affect the printing process and will likely delay delivery of the guide to voters in approximately 11 million households and county clerks beyond the legally prescribed
